4. Programme

1) About the 10th Global Conference of the Alliance for Healthy Cities (AFHC)

The 10th Global Conference of AFHC is co-hosted by the Seoul Metropolitan Government and AFHC. It is an important event held every other year among the member cities of AFHC in the Western Pacific Region. As an event for member cities to network, collaborate, and share best practices to protect and promote the health of urban populations, the Conference will invite the world's best health policy cities and others to showcase the 20 years of achievements of AFHC.

2) Theme and Sub-Themes

The Conference will be organized under the theme, "Smarter and Healthier Cities for a Better Future", with the following sub-themes to guide the discussions in the Mayors' Forum, plenary and parallel sessions.

Sub-Theme 1: Building a blueprint for smart healthy cities with true connectivity and collaboration

Building a blueprint for a smart and healthy city means recognizing the essential components of people, environment, and systems, and the need to intelligently connect and collaboratively integrate them. This session will be a place to discuss the smart healthy cities that each city envisions. We will look at the values and directions that smart healthy cities should firmly pursue, the concepts and principles that underpin smart healthy cities, and the intelligent connectivity of citizens and cities to promote health.

Sub-Theme 2: Creating a sustainable and resilient healthy city for the future

Recently, there has been a growing societal demand for cities to cultivate sustainability and resilience in response to health crises. The imperative to create sustainable and resilient urban environments in the context of health disasters has become critical. In this session, we will focus on the urgent need to bring sustainability and resilience to healthy cities. We will explore alternative strategies tailored to respond to the climate crisis, emphasizing the importance of creating sustainable and healthy urban environments. This includes initiatives such as creating a secure food supply and promoting healthy food environments, which are critical components for the future well-being of our cities. We will also explore strategic approaches to building a sustainable, safe and healthy city, with a particular focus on the needs of the next generation.

Sub-Theme 3: Achieving health equity in the city: Our Commitment and Initiatives

Achieving health equity in the city requires organized, systematic, and collaborative efforts among stakeholders. Systematic action to reduce social and economic inequities and effective policy development are essential. This comprehensive approach is critical to promoting balanced development and maintaining a healthy urban environment. The session will explore strategies for improving health equity in the context of a healthy city and discuss approaches to reducing health inequities. Topics of discussion will include inclusive growth for a socially and economically equitable healthy city, efforts to reduce social and economic inequities, and the promotion of age-friendly healthy cities that support healthy aging.

3) Global Health Leaders' Forum

This session, which explores the complexity of urban development, aims to clarify the crucial role of local government authorities and leaders in establishing a sustainable smart health foundation for future cities and to review strategies for building an international cooperation framework among local governments.

The discussion will cover the multifaceted responsibilities, strategic initiatives, and cooperation needed by leaders to successfully navigate the complexities of building a robust environment that supports a smart health city.

The forum's theme will revolve around "Establishing an International Cooperation Framework for Building Sustainable Smart and Healthy Cities." The specific topics for discussion will include the expansion of healthy cities, the intersection of climate crisis and healthy cities, and addressing health equity through case study presentations or short speeches.

This forum will consist of interactive debate sessions with mayors/representatives, lasting 1 to 1.5 hours, where selected participants will present their cases. At the end of the session, the moderator will summarize the discussion and outline key learning points for all participants to utilize.

4) Keynote Speech

Transitioning to Smart and Sustainable Healthy Cities

Our overarching goal is to cultivate 'Healthy Cities' where well-being is embedded in every facet of urban life. Emphasizing the synergy between health and sustainability, we advocate a transformation to a 'Smart Health City'.

This paradigm shift not only envisions the integration of cutting-edge technologies for health, but also addresses the imperative need for sustainable development. Our focus is on charting a course that not only prioritizes health in policymaking, but also promotes the transition to an urban landscape that is both smart and sustainable.

Through this discourse, we aim to set the agenda for the vital discussions surrounding the imperative transformation to a healthier, smarter and more sustainable urban future.

5) Plenary Session 1

Crafting the roadmap for smart healthy cities

Urban policies and initiatives designed to improve quality of life in a healthy environment for all city residents, irrespective of socio-economic status, have reached their limits due to rapid demographic, social, and environmental changes that vary by city size and characteristics. Therefore, we propose redefining the concept of a healthy city by integrating smart technologies to foster discussions about the vision of the smart health city we aspire to create.

6) Plenary Session 2

Alternatives to address climate and other crises in sustainable healthy cities

Discuss how cities in the Western Pacific region are preparing health-friendly cities for medically underserved populations in the face of health issues caused by climate change, etc

This session primarily addresses the application of the One Health approach at the urban level, emphasizing communication and collaboration across various sectors to achieve better public health outcomes.

It also considers human health within the organic relationships among animals, the environment, and ecosystems, and discusses sustainable development strategies for future health cities that address health threats.

7) Plenary Session 3

Our commitments and efforts to advance health equity

Summarize and highlight the main points of discussion from each session and discuss the development direction, key strategies, and possibilities of future healthy cities.

8) Parallel Sessions

The Conference plans to conduct seven individual sessions on the following topics:

- 1. Strategies and Challenges for Building Healthy Citizens, Healthy Cities Using Smart Technologies
- 2. Realizing a Safe and Healthy City, Free from Infectious Diseases
- 3. Seoul's Policy of Accompanying the Vulnerable, from a Healthy City Perspective
- 4. How to Develop a HiAP-based Healthy City Multisectoral Cooperation System
- 5. Food Policies Beneficial for Health and the Environment
- 6. Age-Friendly Healthy Cities Promoting Healthy Aging
- 7. Next Generation's Perspective on Healthy City Challenges and Their Roles

We aim to present various approaches to improving city health from different perspectives, comprehensively addressing policies, technology, and cooperation strategies to contribute to building a healthy city.
